

Once again, I would like to thank you for your previous support of the Rendham Mummers and I am pleased to announce that for the first time in a few years we can put on our Summer Play. This year the proceeds will go to two local Charities, the IP17 Foodbank and Suffolk Accident Rescue Service (SARs).

Help the Rendham Mummers celebrate the Summer Solstice at the Sweffling White Horse on June 21st and on July 23rd at the park in Rendham. Both performances begin at 7.30 pm - be there early.

The Armada Reaches Rendham is set in the year 1588 and Drake has won the Queen a great victory. To celebrate he has organised a trip to Rendham. Unbeknown to all, a Spanish warship goes aground off Dunwich and four Spanish sailors make it to shore where they rendezvous with the traitorous Sir William of Bruisyard. As the Queen

dances with the villagers the Catholic plotters draw near. Will they succeed where the Armada failed? There is only one way to find out, come and join us for some riotous fun and help celebrate in the summer sunshine. There will be a cash collection taken at both performances to support two local charities.

About SARs - SARS is a voluntary emergency medical charity that provides advanced prehospital medical care at the scene of serious medical emergencies throughout Suffolk and its border areas with Norfolk, Cambridgeshire and Essex. The charity was set up in 1972 and is now celebrating its 50th year of emergency response. SARS clinicians include consultants in emergency medicine, anaesthetists and critical care paramedics who are able to carry out advanced procedures at the scenes of incidents which would not normally be possible outside a hospital environment. These can be truly life-saving interventions as well as reducing the chances of patients suffering permanent disability. Over the course of the last 50 years SARS responders have helped treat thousands of patients and saved countless lives. SARS responders offer their time and services without charge and volunteer in their spare time. SARS receives no central government funding and relies on voluntary donations to maintain its activity. <u>NATURE NOTES JUNE - JULY 2022</u>



For my birthday last year, I got one of those 'trail' cameras which has a motion detector, to try and record some of the night-time wildlife around the house. I finally managed to set it without it going off at the least little drop of rain or puff of wind. Although we see plenty of Rabbits and the occasional Muntjac Deer, results so far have been quite modest. However, last week we did get a picture of a Fox, shown here. This should not be unusual, as Foxes are common in the area. If ever there is snow, it is easy to find Fox

tracks all about, and those with the nose for it can commonly detect their scent markings. But I see them only very rarely, so it is good to get one on camera.

I did not hear a Cuckoo until the beginning of May, but since then up until the time of writing, one has been calling in the valley, not far from Dernford, for some time every day. All of our neighbours have commented on hearing him. I am always keen to see him, (it is the 'him' who calls), and in some years we can see him from our upstairs window, usually in one of the dead trees, or on a wire. This year I have had to look harder, and I did see him in the Willow wood along Potash Lane. There were briefly two, but one was chased off. Of the other summer migrants Chiffchaffs, Blackcaps, Whitethroats and Lesser Whitethroats have all been

common. There are good numbers of Nightingales in the Woodland Trust's Pound Farm, although as usual, hard to see. Swallows, and House Martins however up until now been very few and far between. By the time you read this they should be here in better numbers, and the Swifts should all be back. Look out for them.



In late Spring and early Summer there is an enormously rapid growth in the vegetation along the verges and hedges. The earlier flowers like Cowslips and Stitchwort are being swamped by the grasses, and particularly by the Cow-Parsley. I am

astonished by how quickly this shoots up. Within a few days its white flowers are dominating the verges. There are also other members of the Cow-parsley family, most of which flower later in the year, but one which I have noticed more this year is flowering now This is a small (about



one foot tall), delicate parsley, with much smaller flowers in small, loose heads, and much softer, more feathery leaves. The small, oval seeds are covered in tiny hooks, which stick to passing trousers and socks, or particularly to animal fur. It is common along Sweffling Street, and further along Glemham Road, and I am puzzled that I have not noticed it before.

I hope people have noticed that much of the Churchyard this spring is a white mass of yet another small cow-parsley. This is Pig-nut, or Earth-nut, a tiny

umbellifer with narrowly divided, Fennel-like leaves. As you know, I am very fond of this rather unprepossessing plant, and described last year how we boys used to grub up and eat the tubers. Although unspectacular, as an indicator plant it signifies an area of old, unimproved grassland, and therefore of conservation value. It is found hardly anywhere else in our villages. I am delighted that our churchyard management is suiting it and other plants so well. It has also suited the Clustered Clover, a small, dull pink clover, nationally rare, found hardly anywhere except Suffolk and scarce even here – an exciting find. *Geoffrey Abbott*
