NATURE NOTES OCT - NOV 2022



Last month the night-time trail camera had a big surprise for us. There, in the corner of our garden, by the Hedgehog house was a full-grown Badger. I have known that there are Badgers present in our area since we first came here, although they are seldom seen. I have been told of sightings at night along nearby roads, such as Glemham Road. Their tracks can sometimes be found in muddy places, for instance alongside the River Alde, and the footpath along the top of the Jubilee Field. Look for a print with five toes (as opposed to four in dogs and foxes), with four of them parallel and with long

parallel claws clearly showing. Badger dung is usually left in small pits, and not covered over as with cats. They eat almost anything, plant and animal, often specialising in earthworms in damper weather, but some foods may be clearly shown as in cherry stones (near the churchyard), or blackberries. There are Badger setts in woods close to us in neighbouring villages, typically with several large entrances and signs of recent digging.



One sign of Badger activity is the predation of wasps' nests which have been dug out and opened up so that the larvae they contain can be eaten. We found one such nest in our neighbouring field, a football-sized hole lined with the concentric patterns of 'paper' that wasps produce, and scattered with bits of the combs of cells where the larvae are reared. We were also shown a similar excavated nest in the roadside bank just along towards the village. Apparently, Badgers dig into these underground nests (an easy job for their

strong, sharp claws) starting away from the entrance where they would meet most of the angry wasps. My question, as everybody else's must be, is 'why don't they get stung?' In fact, only the tip of the nose is vulnerable. Everywhere else the fur is thick enough to protect from stings. Even so, they must get stung, and I know of no evidence that they are immune. They must just not be very sensitive. One big nest makes a good meal for a Badger for one night.

Sadly, another part of the Badger's diet is the Hedgehog – bad news for the many Hedgehog lovers in the village. Although the Hedgehog's spines, and rolling into a ball, are protection against other predators, Badgers, with their strong claws, are able to open them up. The evidence is a distinctively scooped-out carcase. I have come across two of these recently, and I know others have too.



One of the galls which people find most conspicuous at this time of year is on the English Oak tree, where it forms a growth which arises from, or even completely covers, the acorn. This extraordinary and striking gall is called a Knopper Gall. It is up to 10mm in diameter, formed by several flattened ridges, green and sticky at first but becoming brown and dry as it falls off. Like many Oak galls the cause is a tiny wasp, growing as a larva in the gall tissue, passing the winter on the ground in the dead gall and emerging in

the spring. There is an extra generation forming a little-known gall on the Oak catkins.

Knoppers only arrived in Britain in the 1950s, when there was at first some concern that they would destroy the acorn crop - unfounded as it turned out.
