# As RINGING NEWS

As we enter our eleventh year of eight bells at Rendham, the hard work and dedication of the Restoration Committee and our supporters has been vindicated. The bells are well used for teaching and practising, but above all, are used to let everyone know when the service is at Rendham.

Ringing is a fine tradition, kept alive and developed fairly easily in the large town churches and cathedrals; it can be harder in villages these days with more challenging demographics than of yore. But here in Rendham and Sweffling we have a growing band drawn from around the area. Growing in numbers and in skills. We use our twice monthly quarter peals to push those skills along; our two March quarters scored a couple of firsts. Little Bob Major on Friday 8<sup>th</sup>, ably conducted by our friend Mike Whitby was Tim Stanford's first in the method and I had the pleasure of calling Ian Wright's first of Grandsire Triples on the 15<sup>th</sup>. Triples means the method is rung on seven bells, with the eighth bell, the tenor, ringing last every row.

In May we have two striking competitions; the District and the Guild. Between Rendham and Sweffling we have three trophies on display from last year; you will know in due course whether we hold on to any or all of them!

Whilst the building works are under way in St Michael's, we hope to keep the bells ringing even if the church is otherwise closed, so you won't get out of the habit of listening to a fine, very English, sound.

## Commemorative Oak Tree:

The Clerk has been asked to enter the oak tree planted on the P.A.R.K. for the Diamond Jubilee into the Woodland Trust Tree Planting Royal Record. There will be details of thousands of celebration trees and a record of trees planted in 2012 for the Diamond Jubilee. There is also a map of where they have been planted. The collection will then be presented to Her Majesty the Queen and a copy will be preserved in the British Library for generations to come.

## Plaque for the Commemorative Oak Tree:

At the May Parish meeting there will be a discussion concerning whether a plaque is to be placed by the tree or whether a framed copy of the above Record entry together with a picture of the planting be placed somewhere in the village, maybe the Village Hall. Come along and give your views.

## Police Report:

PSCO Hassler sent a report to the Council meeting where he stated that there had been no crimes of interest to Rendham. However he did give a warning about the thefts of catalytic converters. There had been five incidents in the last week in Suffolk Coastal District.

This was mainly to 4x4 and commercial vehicles. He advised that where possible vehicles should be kept in a secure garage and parked in a way that would make it difficult to gain access to the catalytic converter. # NATURE NOTES

In April and especially May there are white butterflies other than the common 'cabbage whites' to look out for. Easiest to recognise is the Orange Tip. This is a real sign of spring, a small white butterfly with bright orange wingtips (in the male) and a marbled green underside. The female is similar but with dark grey wingtips. Its main foodplant is one of our common hedgerow plants, the Garlic Mustard (also called Jack-by-the-hedge), a member of the cress family but which really does smell of garlic when crushed. The caterpillars are long, thin and green, matching the long seed pods of this plant. I suspect that in gardens it is also found on Honesty plants. There is just one generation per year. By August the caterpillar has become a chrysalis, in which form it will remain until emerging as a butterfly next spring. Other favourite spring flowers are also important to insects as early providers of nectar. When we moved here we were delighted to find so many Primroses on the verges, at least along lanes which have not been salted. Look out also for the delicate white Stitchwort, yellow Celandines and, in a few places

along the river, the large golden flowers of the Kingcup, or Marsh Marigold. Long-tailed tits are always popular birds to see in the garden, and many people have seen groups of these attractive birds during the winter. The long tail, and the tiny body with its black, white and pinkish striped plumage are quite unlike any other bird. They are particularly fond of peanuts and fat balls, which they visit in groups. By now though, they have formed pairs and these social groups have broken up. They nest early,

usually choosing the protection of a dense, thorny bush (in our garden they have twice used a small *Berberis*). The nest is an amazing ball of moss and spiders webs, lined with feathers and with a hole in the side. The outside is covered with grey lichens, a necessary camouflage as the leaves that would hide the nest may not yet be out.

Not everyone is a fan of Bullfinches, and the damage they can do is undeniable. Years ago in an orchard in East Bergholt I was shown damage they had done to apple blossom amounting to thousands of pounds! Apparently this happens if an abundance of bullfinches coincides with a year when their natural foods, such as ash seeds, are scarce. However, the Bullfinch is one of those birds of garden or farmland which has suffered a big decline in recent years and I have enjoyed watching a pair around the garden recently. Despite the male's bright colours they can be quite shy and hard to see, and the faint plaintive call can be useful in finding them. They have favoured the seeds of the ornamental *Acer* tree, and in spring the flower buds of the *Amelanchier*, a close relative of the apple.

In April and May all of our migrant birds return. Earliest are the Chiffchaffs. Quite common also by April are Blackcaps. The males are inconspicuous, grey with a neat black cap, but with quite a loud and musical song. Swallows and Martins are only slightly later, but the Swifts which nest in our villages are not usually here until early May. **Geoffrey Abbott**

Our thanks to Charles Seely for the captivating talk he gave us in February about his grandmother's great-uncle, Robert Lowe, the man in the old family photo album. This extraordinary man was an albino, and therefore had terribly poor eyesight, but he combatted such difficulties to eventually become Chancellor of the Exchequer. Charles traced Lowe's story from settling in Australia as a lawyer, and becoming a prominent politician, through his return to England to continue in politics at home, and so he gave us a fascinating insight into 19th century society, the House of Commons and Queen Victoria's court. Charles' tale of the life of a man known for his brilliance and wit was a great way to finish our winter programme of talks.

Don't forget that they will resume next winter, when we would love to see you again and appreciate your continued support. In the meantime, enjoy the summer!

### **Friends of St Michael's fund-raising for church restoration:**

*Next phase of work to start after Easter*

You might remember Rev Jonathan Olanczuk's letter in the last edition of *The Street* about the fund-raising efforts of the Friends of St Michael's. We are now delighted to be able to tell you that the next major works to preserve the fabric of the church are about to begin! We have been fantastically successful in raising the £26,000 necessary for the next phase. The Wolfson Foundation has committed £5,000, the Suffolk Historic Churches Trust has contributed directly to the PCC, and we have secured funding from the Garfield Weston Foundation, the Norman Scarfe Trust, and the Alfred William Charitable Trust. Most impressively of all, most of the funding will come from the Friends of St Michael's. This is all thanks to you Rendhamites who have supported us in all sorts of ways: making donations directly and through LocalGiving, and by attending all sorts of events over the last many months, from fabulous concerts and delicious suppers to the varied programme of the winter talks (how many people in the world have even seen the Suffolk Punch stud book?).

Our particular thanks to Anji Hart for getting the grant-application ball rolling, and then to trustee, Caroline Stanley who has spent hours completing, submitting and then following up applications, with gratifying results! Our work is not over by any means as there will be more essential restoration work to undertake, but we can be proud of our achievements to date.

The work starts on April 8. The timbers will be treated for woodworm, there will be a lot of plaster repairs and repointing, the walls will be redecorated with specialist microporous paint, and ventilation will be improved so that the building can breathe. During the work the church will be unfortunately have to be closed. We expect this phase of works to be done in 2 sections: the church will therefore close from just before 8 April until approximately 17 May, and will reopen for roughly 4 weeks until 17 June, when it will close again for the decorating works to be done. As with all building work, these dates may change – please check the village website and the church noticeboards for any updates. If you have any questions, please contact the churchwardens.
